



# Students receive \$146,000 in scholarships

The spotlight shone brightly on 75 Victor Valley College students this spring as each received scholarships during the Foundation's annual Scholarship Recognition Ceremony in the Performing Arts Center. This year's scholarship award total surpassed the amount given last year by nearly 16 percent thanks to contributions by more than 40 community sponsors and endowment funds. In all, approximately \$146,000 will be awarded to just over 140 VVC Students pursuing their educational dreams at Victor Valley College.

Students in the High Desert often struggle to make ends meet. Many work at least part time, are single parents or come from families of modest means. For these students especially, the cost of college can be a real stumbling block on their way to completion and distract them from their road to success. This was evident when communications student and single mother Brenda Rombalski gave her testimonial during the ceremony. Rombalski received the Diane Wollen "Never Too Late To Bloom" scholarship and Dr. Bettye Underhill Memorial Endowment scholarship. "I cried with joy when I heard I had received these scholarships," she said. "I know they will help me pay for my tuition and my books and to make sure I have the ability to take my classes and remain a full time student."

"Awarding scholarships tells the recipients we believe in them and can alleviate some real financial challenges," said Norm Hurst, the Victor Valley College Foundation Scholarship Chairperson. "The Foundation's emphasis this year is Student Success and scholarships support that focus."

The Foundation's program continues to be the leading clearinghouse of scholarship awards for High Desert residents pursing their education at Victor Valley College. They help nursing students learn to save lives, fuel education for aviation

technicians in training and pave the way for transfer students to advance. In fact, awards are made to students pursuing just about every major the College offers and are typically given to those who demonstrate financial need, community service or academic success. Applications are accepted at the beginning of VVC's Spring Semester to prepare for the following academic year.

A letter from the director.

Forty years! Some days it feels like forever, on other days it seems like only vesterday we were driving through the VVC campus wondering if this would be the place God had for us to begin building our college teachina/performance career. Summer of 1971 we were driving back to Southern California after two areat vears of masters study at Southern Methodist University. As we traversed the barren stretch of I-15 between Barstow and Victorville in a car without air conditioning, my bride looked out the window and uttered those fateful words, "Who would want to live in a God forsaken place like this?" My comeback was words to the effect, "Don't say that too loud, God has an ironic sense of humor." And of course after completing doctoral coursework at USC, we ultimately wound up here, where we discovered that God had not forsaken it! Now, all these years later we arrive at the completion of this phase of our life with a heart overflowing from so

Special thanks to the many community musicians who came together starting more than twenty five years ago to form our Sinfonia orchestra and create a unique history of choral and orchestral performances almost unrivaled amona community colleges. Finally, and most importantly, I salute the thousands of students who I have been privileged to teach, who have taught me as much or more than I may have taught them. I cherish so many special relationships and look forward to continuina them.

Retiring from a position one loves is not an easy decision, especially for musicians. Many have asked what I plan to do next year. In addition to my church music position, I have many opportunities to continue to mentor our alumni when called upon and to attend their performances. I need to get back to publishing





much of the music that I have written as well as find a production company for our full length musical "Rising Star". I have lots of new music to write, some albums to produce, and I can come back to teach part time as needed. There will be more time to spoil our grandkids Alexander and Johnathan, more time to spend with our wonderful "kid couples," and, last but by no means least, my wife Faith has a list for me that will occupy us until 2040! And God may yet have plans that He hasn't yet shared.

I have always looked on teaching, performing, composing, and conducting as a calling to ministry, not just a job or a vocation. It is a precious trust full of responsibilities, hard work, and dedication that brings iov in abundance in ways that few other "jobs" are able to do. I salute my wonderful bride of 47 years for her key part in the success of our program. And I garee with the prophet Isaiah, "O Lord, you make us secure, for even all we have accomplished you have done for us."

# Ontiveros resigns; Board moves to appoint Catherine Abbott



After serving 15 years as the Executive Director of the Victor Valley College Foundation, Ginger Ontiveros handed off the reigns to the organization's Director of Development / Assistant Executive Director Catherine Abbott. Ontiveros is the new Executive Director of Community Engagement for the San Bernardino City Unified School District this June.

"I am very excited for the opportunity before me, but saying goodbye to my Victor Valley College Foundation family hurts," said Ontiveros. "We have done important work together to make education more accessible and relevant for a community I love. Fortunately, with Catherine Abbott stepping forward I know that work will continue without missing a step."

Ontiveros began her tenure with the Foundation in July 2001. Since that time, she has built a legacy of support for Victor Valley College resulting in new programs to open doors for graduates seeking jobs in emerging local industries and expanded capacity of existing programs to provide more opportunity for students. The organization delivered millions of dollars to help the College update equipment and build additional facilities. Student organizations on campus engaged in life-changing educational experiences with support from the Foundation and individual students benefitted from scholarships that made their education more attainable.

Under her leadership, the Foundation has grown substantially in size, stature, and fiscal strength. In 2001, the organization had two employees, a strong board of directors, and about \$700K in assets. Today, the team includes seven employees, is governed by one of the most highly respected boards in the Victor Valley, and has nearly \$6 million in assets. Ontiveros has been a key factor in the organization's success. "There are no words to express the loss that Ginger's departure is for our community," said Eric Schmidt, President of the Victor Valley College Foundation. "We are fortunate however, that she did a great job of preparing the organization for a smooth transition. Catherine's experience has prepared her to continue moving forward."

Catherine Abbott joined the Victor Valley College Foundation staff as the Director of Development and Assistant Executive Director in January 2012, having previously served five years as the Executive Director of the Sunset Hills Children's Foundation. Abbott's executive leadership experience coupled with her current role, made her the likely choice to succeed Ontiveros. The Victor Valley College Foundation Board of Directors made the plan for the transition official Thursday, April 14. Abbott

officially assumed the role on May 6, 2016.

"We were very fortunate in this transition," said Schmidt. "When high profile resignations occur, many nonprofit organizations find themselves with a lapse of executive staff leadership that can halt their momentum. We won't have that challenge because of good planning by our management team and wise action of our board."

The Foundation continues its focus on supporting student success initiatives at Victor Valley College. This initiative has delivered \$1.5 million of support through philanthropic gifts and grants so far in 2016. These resources will help the College to more strategically offer tutoring, educational experiences and instruction resulting in more college completions. In a related effort, the Foundation facilitates scholarships from dozens of local organizations including several within the College campus and recently awarded more than \$146,000 in scholarships for the 2016-2017 academic year.

"I am very proud of this Foundation," said Ontiveros. "It is strong and effective in its mission. Knowing that it is being left in such capable hands gives me great comfort."
